Thinking of an "OUT OF THE BOX" career?

These days, mainstream career advice tells us to follow our passion. "If you love what you do, you'll never work a day in your life." But is that true? Earlier generations chose careers that offered job security, life-long employment and a good pension. But today's students have an ever-increasing menu of career choices, partly due to the globalization of the world economy.

If you're considering an offbeat or non-mainstream career, you'll likely hear strong opinions on the downsides. Our advice is no different than for any career, mainstream or not. Look before you leap and do the necessary due diligence before making your choice. We asked some of our Catapulters about their experience when they chose their un-common path.

Noah Claremont '16 is in his first year of 'Foundation Visual Arts' at the NB College of Craft & Design in Fredericton. He's getting an overview of all the college's programs while building a portfolio to prepare his entry into their 2-year photography diploma. His ultimate goal is to become a Forensic Photographer and photograph crime scenes as part of investigations. "I've always LOVED photography but my teachers and people I knew who had started their own business all told me 'you're gonna be happy

but broke'. A lot of people said I should find a real job. At first, it was kind of a joke to prove them wrong, but the more I looked into it the more I knew I could actually do it. Now that I'm at NBCCD with other photography students, and teachers who are photographers, it's such a different energy. I'm loving it."

Jacob Lenethen '16 is studying Music Production and Engineering at NSCC Ivany Campus. It's a 2-year program and he'll graduate in 2021. "The course focuses on producing music at a professional level in a studio setting but also covers different aspects of the music industry like marketing and networking as well as basics like music theory. My goal is to become a well respected and recognized producer and own my own studio where I can produce music for others as well as my own projects. I've always had a passion for music but never felt like I fit into one role within the industry. This feels like something I can carve

my own path into and shape my career into what I



envision. Most of my life, people told me music wasn't a real job and I'd never make a living for myself. It wasn't until my 18th birthday that I decided to commit to my dream. I still hadn't decided on my post secondary plans by graduation, but when I spoke to an NSCC advisor and heard about the new MP&E program, I immediately knew it was for me."

During high school, Jamie Lee MacIsaac '11 wanted to become a TV sports announcer. She took

advantage of our offer to provide career coaching and mentorship so we connected her to Nancy Regan. "The opportunity to chat with Nancy about potential career options in TV helped me out greatly. She motivated me to take the initiative to pursue my dream and I was accepted into the College of Sports Media in Toronto." Jamie Lee graduated in 2016 and a 4-week internship at CP24 for camera operations followed. She's still there, working as a Live Eye Camera Operator. Jamie Lee told us persistence and patience is key when choosing a difficult field like sports media, and you need to be willing to


relocate since there aren't many opportunities in NS. But she sure has had fun, with access to lots of sporting events and fan fun like Jurassic Park during this year's NBA playoffs. . "I've covered a lot of great things, but interviewing Scarlett Johansson at Toronto's 2019 International Film Festival is one of my favorite moments ever."



Sam Dykeman '13 will graduate next year with a

BSc in Agriculture Business, with a minor in environmental science, from Dalhousie's Agricultural Campus. "I've always had a passion for agriculture. In fact when I was 10, I wrote a business case to buy cows! Farming is the fabric of rural livelihood. I've been fortunate to visit Kenya on a food study mission plus agricultural focused trips to Uganda and Ethiopia, amazing experiences that are helping me develop a business case for increasing environmental efficiencies.

My dream job is to help Canadian farmers adapt to climate changes while also improving profitability. Growing up in Truro, I always knew about the agricultural campus. But I still feel like I fell into it. I actually began a nursing degree at UPEI, but after only 1 week I knew I had to leave and follow my passion. Luckily, Dal let me start late so I didn't miss any time."



Animation and Modeling for Video Games. After a couple years looking for work in the field, she took a chance and moved to Victoria, BC to work at a small graphic design studio. But it's a tough industry and layoffs soon followed. So she made the decision to go back to school. She's now studying Information and Computer Systems at Camosun College, hoping for better job security. "I was a little nervous

going back to school but I love the program and am doing really well. My advice for students trying to decide on what they want to pursue is to first look at what they enjoy doing. Next take a step back and look at what makes you enjoy doing those things. Figuring out those core interests and values helps a lot when trying to decide what to pursue."

Jacob's advice if you're undecided is to "simply be who you are, follow your passions and chase your dreams". Noah says, "If you have the chance to try something new, do it. If you love it, look for ways you could make a career out of it. Don't listen to the haters!" Sam's advice goes a little further. "The fact that my undergrad program has a 97% job rate helped me make my decision. Don't be afraid to start a program - you can almost always transfer your first-year credits if you change your mind."

We say, "Dream with your eyes wide open". Do your homework before choosing your path. Sometimes, a job that you like 'well enough' will provide the income to support your passion in your personal time. Consider your interests, skills and values. What education is needed? Are you willing to relocate if needed? Will the salary support the lifestyle you want and let you chase other dreams? Will there be opportunities for continuous growth? Remember, our happiness is derived from all areas of our life so it's important to not only choose a career you love, but one that also matches your values!

"I saw how happy the participants got while playing the games and we campers loved it almost as much. It was amazing to see everyone coming together and just having a really good time." Emily thought about the learning centre back at her school. "I've noticed our Learning Centre students only get about two events each year. And I realized they probably don't know many students other than their friends in the learning centre."

So she decided to share Acadia's SMILE concept with her Principal and her own plan to create a SMILE Club at Breton Education Centre. "She loved it! We're still getting started, but we're picking one day a week where me and a few friends go to the learning centre and eat, play games etc.

WHY YOU MUST BELIEVE YOU ARE SPECIAL

At Catapult Camp's opening we always start off by telling you that you are special. And that your grade 9 teacher thinks you're special. And we hope that by the end of the week, you might believe that it's true.

As we get older, we often focus more on our weaknesses than our talents. Our weaknesses make us think we are not enough. We fear that others will see our imperfections and will think less of us, maybe even discard us. We feel it's safer to conform, blend in. Never stand out.

Instagram's contrived perfection doesn't help. Its relentless barrage of staged, perfect lifestyles makes you worry that everyone is perfect – except you.

Losing our focus on what makes us unique and special is how we begin losing our way in the world. Every one of us is born with a collection of gifts and talents. While some might argue that to search for our own uniqueness is indulgent, eastern spirituality teaches that it is actually our responsibility to do so. Hinduism says we each have our own personal duty or dharma to fulfil—something that is completely unique to us.

Your calling doesn't need to be spectacular. You don't need to cure cancer or become the next Ed Sheeran. Your calling means serving the world in a way that no one else can. There is a saying that goes, "The purpose of life is to discover your gift. The work of life is to develop it. The meaning of life is to give your gift away." Kassidy Bernard '12 is one of two Canadian youth chosen to design official 'I Voted' stickers for

Instagram. Her sticker will be integrated into Instagram's stories function, in hopes of sparking more political engagement in the days leading up to the election.

Kassidy received \$5,000 and a trip to Instagram's headquarters in San Francisco!

Kassidy is currently studying at NSCAD. She focused her efforts on engaging racialized and Indigenous youth, youth from rural communities, unemployed youth, and youth with disabilities. "All of them have specific barriers ... a disconnect between Canadian politics, Canadian identity and themselves, lack of resources and information about the elections. They didn't think it was relevant for them to vote." she says. "I feel so happy to be able to blend my passions of design and youth engagement into something that will encourage youth voters this election. My call to action also comes with a few reminders:

- Make an informed vote. Who are the candidates in your local riding? Pay attention to their actions as much as the party leaders. Watch or attend debates. Learn what each party's platform includes.
- 2. Register and prepare to vote. Elections.ca has all the information you need including ID requirements and details on how to vote as a disabled person or a student if you are away from your home riding.
- 3. **Talk about the election** with friends, family, and strangers. Talk about the issues, advocate for those who will be impacted. Talk about the importance of voting. Voting is a form of harm reduction!
- 4. Help others get to polling stations with car pools or volunteer with childcare.

 Build community while you're at it!
- 5. Understand our work doesn't stop when the election is over. We need to continue to demand justice for those most oppressed. We need to be actively and vocally anti-oppressive. We need to hold our elected officials accountable.
